The following directions and/or procedures touch and concern inter alia, Court hearings, filings and dates. Being cognizant of these directions, the ancillary matters associated with same, and all communication emanating from the Judiciary and other entities with like powers and/or duties, is key to ensuring that your legal practice functions at its optimum during these challenging times. 


## **E-HEARINGS**

ELECTRONIC HEARINGS AND VIRTUAL COURT-POOMS

- Electronic hearings and Virtual Courts have been operationalised to deal with urgent matters during this period. In preparation for this, practitioners should ensure that their devices meet the minimum software and hardware requirements to attend such hearings.
- The Judiciary has selected Microsoft (MS) Teams as its preferred method for these hearings.
- The software "Microsoft Teams" is available on various platforms, including MS Windows, Mac OS, iOS, Android and Linux.
- Microsoft (MS) advises that any computer using Teams should have a processor with at least 1.6Ghz and 2GB of Random Access Memory.
- The device chosen should also have ample audio and video capabilities, and a reliable internet connection (an internet bandwidth of 10Mbps or higher is recommended).
- While attending these hearings, both practitioners and their clients should observe and abide by the well-established Court etiquette, protocol and procedures, such as attire and the manner in which one addresses the Court.
- In keeping with the foregoing, it is therefore essential that the location selected by you and your clients to attend these hearings, is adequate to conduct the session.



- The space should be well lit and free from any distractions and/or disturbances.
- In general, a professional setting must be maintained throughout the course of the proceedings.
- Where your office comprises of several attorneys who are likely to be required to attend virtual hearings, a schedule should be made to ensure appropriate allocation of shared resources for e-hearings.
- Additionally, you are to provide all that is necessary to facilitate the hearings on your side; by way of example, if an oath is to be taken by someone attending the hearing at your office, you are to ensure that the relevant religious text is available to effect same.
- Kindly note, it remains possible for a witness to make a solemn affirmation pursuant and/or in accordance with section 6 of the Oaths Act Chapter 7:01 if applicable.
- If your case is to be heard at one of the twelve (12) Virtual Courts setup by the Judiciary to deal with Criminal matters, you are advised to contact the Judiciary in advance for guidance in relation to same.

Attorneys are also advised to register for e-services with the Judiciary at <a href="https://eservices.ttlawcourts.org/login">https://eservices.ttlawcourts.org/login</a> in preparation for when filing of all matters electronically (regardless of their gravity), become available.

Please ensure that you follow all guidelines issued by the Judiciary when filing electronically. The most recent release from the Judiciary in connection with the above was issued on the 2nd April, 2020, and can be viewed <u>here</u>.

APPLICATIONS

The Judiciary has advised that from Monday 4th May, 2020, new applications can be filed at the Probate Registry via their E-portal. They have further advised, that the Lodging of bonds, caveats, warnings, searches for appearance and citations for approval should be e-mailed to the Registry at the following address: Probate.online@ttlawcourts.org



#### REGISTRAR'S GENERAL DEPARTMENT


ONLINE SERVICES

Effective 19th March, 2020, the Registrar's General Department (RGD) revised significantly the procedures for access to their services. Many of the said services provided by the RGD are now being offered online.

These online services include inter alia, Electronic Payments, Land and Company searches of the databases held at the RGD, Electronic Filing, and applications for birth, marriage and death certificates.
